High School Basketball: BMHS Girls Fall to Argyle; WHHS Cougar Boys Defeat BMHS Bobcat Boys

The Benbrook girls basketball team lost to Argyle in the bi-district round last week, but not before winning their play-in (second place) game to finish as district runner-up and win 10 games in 8-4A competition.

Coach Leta Lofton said her feelings on the season are mostly positive, but somewhat mixed.

"I guess we can call this season a successful failure," Lofton said. "The team fought through adversity all season. With the ups and downs of the season, athletes and coaches were affected by the pandemic. We never had a consistent team on the court. I am sure many teams experienced this.

"Although adversity hit us from all sides, I am proud of the fact that our athletes were able to rise above and advance to the playoffs. I am proud of their efforts and perseverance. We are looking forward to learning from our playoff mistakes and return next year as a more experienced, knowledgeable and stronger team."

Joydan Overton led the Lady Cats in scoring against Argyle with 12 points, while Miah Overton added 8 points in the game.

Quiarra Bolton, Cassie Stenbridge and Madison Sorrell all scored 4 points a piece, and Zoey Smothermon added 2 points for Benbrook.

Lofton said she is pleased with the effort she received from her entire team this season, and paid special tribute to one player in particular.

"We have one senior captain," Lofton said.

"Quiarra Bolton has been instrumental for our team both offensively and defensively. What many did not know is that Quiarra has been playing through a knee injury. I can't express how thankful we are to have her as a member of our program. She has been present for the team vocally, mentally, and physically."

On the boy's side, Western Hills defeated Benbrook 60-44 in a play-in game to qualify for the playoffs last week, and coach Justin Bryson said it was pretty much what you would expect when the two teams square off.

"The play in game versus Benbrook was a tough game, especially being our third time playing each other," Bryson said. "The game was back and forth for a while, with us pulling away in the fourth quarter. Both teams played well and represented their programs the right way."

Western Hills had to pull an upset earlier last week to get into a situation where it could play for the fourth playoff spot.

"We won the Eastern Hills game 69-50," Bryson said. "We had to win that game to force a tie. It was our senior night, and the kids played well. It wasn't an easy game, but we ended up pulling away in the end."

The Cougars will have their hands full in the opening round of the playoffs when they take on the top-ranked Argyle Eagles at a time, date and location that had not yet been determined as of Sunday, Feb. 14.

Governor Abbott, TDHCA Announce Statewide COVID-19 Rental Relief Program

Governor Greg Abbott recently announced that the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) has launched the Texas Rent Relief Program, the first statewide rent and utility assistance program for qualifying households throughout Texas. This program has been created to administer the more than \$1 billion allocated to Texas through the latest federal COVID-19 stimulus bill. TDHCA began accepting applications for the program on Monday, Feb. 15, but Texans can visit TexasRentRelief.com to learn more about qualifications, required documents, and the application process.

“The COVID-19 pandemic has placed a significant financial strain on many Texans, and the Texas Rent Relief Program will provide an incredible lifeline to households in need of assistance on their rent and utility payments,” said Governor Abbott.

Speaker Dade Phelan said, “This program is a key component of our state’s pandemic

recovery effort and will be essential to the rebound of our economy, workforce, and education system. I am thrilled that qualifying Texas families have an avenue for temporary relief on essential items like rent and utility payments when it truly counts the most.”

To qualify, households must be at or below 80 percent of the area median income as well as meet other criteria. Per federal guidelines, TDHCA will prioritize applications for households at or below 50 percent of the area median income level and households where one or more members are currently unemployed and have been for at least 90 days. Landlords are encouraged to apply on behalf of tenants, who must co-sign the application.

Applicants can submit their application by calling 1-833-9TX-RENT (1-833-989-7368) or submitting it online at TexasRentRelief.com.

The call center will be open Monday through Saturday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

From Fort Worth ISD

FWISD Partners with Tarrant County for Covid Vaccination Drive-Through Clinics

The Fort Worth ISD Board of Education has partnered with Tarrant County to establish two drive-through COVID vaccination clinics on Fort Worth ISD property. The Board approved the interlocal agreement at a meeting on Feb. 9, 2021.

One clinic will be established in the parking lot adjacent to Billingsley Field House, just east of Farrington Field, on Lancaster Avenue.


The second clinic will be set-up in the parking lot of the Wilkerson-Greines Activities Center, just north of Herman Clark Stadium, at 5201 C.A. Roberson Blvd.

The use of both District locations will be free to the County.

“The Fort Worth ISD has the good fortune of having the available space that Tarrant County needs to provide more convenient locations for citizens to receive the COVID vaccine. The District is very much a part of this community and we are eager to help where we can,” said Superintendent Kent Scribner. “We are also hoping to soon see teachers and others on the front line of education during this pandemic moved up to receive the COVID vaccination as soon as possible, as I recently requested of Governor Abbott.”

Under the agreement, Fort Worth ISD will provide the space and access to some of the District’s buildings onsite. Tarrant County, meanwhile, will provide for the operation of the clinics, vaccination delivery and safety and security.

The agreement is scheduled to be in effect from now until Sept. 30 of this year.



Loren Wallace Watkins

Following a brief illness, Loren Wallace Watkins (SMSGT, Retired, USAF) passed from this life on Jan. 31, 2021.

Born to Murrel and Bertha (Anders) Watkins in Tryon, Okla., on Oct. 21, 1935, Loren was raised in Agra, Okla., the oldest of four brothers and one sister.

He met his wife, Freida Owensby, on a blind double date (they were NOT each other’s date) and married on Sept. 17, 1953. They were married for 67 years and raised five children while traveling with the U.S. Air Force. Among his tours of duty, Loren served three years in Guam and twice in Vietnam. Retiring from the U.S. Air Force after 25 years, Loren went on to work another 20 years for General Dynamics/Lockheed.

Loren was known for his acerbic wit and ability to repair almost anything. Many a young adult received their first auto upkeep lesson from “Papa.” Loren was a favorite uncle and much-loved husband, father, grandfather, and great grandfather. Photos frequently show him from behind holding an infant (his own child, a grandchild, or great grandchild) on his shoulder.

Loren was preceded in death by his parents, three brothers, son-in-law, Thomas Fruge, and son, Stephen Watkins. Loren is survived by his wife, Freida, his daughters Lorna Duke (Dennis), Dorothy Beam (Warren), Nancy Fruge, and Stephanie Steen (Wayne), sister, Karen Witte, as well as 14 grandchildren, 21 great grandchildren, and 2 great-great grandchildren.

Graveside services will be held Feb. 20, 2021, 2 p.m., at Greenwood Cemetery in Fort Worth, Texas. Masks will be required, and social distancing enforced.

Benbrook Voters to Consider Bond for New Municipal Complex

The proposed bond is for design and construction of a new two-story, approximately 35,000 square-foot Benbrook Municipal Complex to house the Police Station, Senior Citizen's Center, Municipal Court, City Hall Offices, and a Visitor's Center. Planned outdoor amenities include a large greenspace for picnics/relaxation, a water fountain/splash feature for public enjoyment, and a band shell for festivals and events on the grounds. *Of importance to city leaders, the project will not result in a property tax rate increase.*

In 2019, as part of the City's updated **2020 Comprehensive Plan**, a Citizen's Committee recommended a new Municipal Complex to replace several existing municipal buildings, and to act as an anchor for a proposed downtown development:

2020 Comprehensive Plan Land Use Goal #6: Establish an active and vibrant downtown Benbrook

Will this project increase my property taxes? Why issue debt?

No, the project will not result in a property tax rate increase. Whenever possible, the City of Benbrook pays cash for capital improvements. A core value of the City is to operate in a fiscally sound manner, keeping taxes and debt obligations low. For a large, significant project such as a new Municipal Complex, financing helps keep property taxes low and allows the City to complete the project sooner than relying on cash reserves. By financing the project now, the City can take advantage of its exceptional credit rating, pay lower interest rates for bonds, and lock in construction costs, avoiding future increased costs of deferred improvements. The City can utilize funds from existing debt that is being paid off toward a new bond, along with other funds in the current budget, to finance the project.

Why do we need a new Municipal Complex?

The City has identified **significant issues with existing municipal buildings**; the buildings are aging and have mechanical issues, electrical problems, ADA non-compliance and/or other challenges. The City also reviewed several other options to remedy the issues related to these structures. Ultimately, the Citizen's Committee recommended proposing a new Municipal Complex to resolve

building failure issues, consolidate several city services for a one-stop shop experience for citizens, save future repair/maintenance costs, and provide a redevelopment anchor opportunity for a Benbrook downtown.

What about public input?

The Citizen's Committee hosted public meetings and open houses to solicit public input prior to making a recommendation. Public hearings were also held by the Planning and Zoning Commission and City Council.

Where will the proposed new Municipal Complex be located?

On the site of the existing Senior Citizen's Center building, 1010 Mercedes Street, located between City Hall and the Police Station. The final location of outdoor elements are to be determined. During construction, Senior Citizen's Center activities will temporarily move to the Benbrook Community Center/Lion's Club building at 228 San Angelo Avenue. The existing Police Station and City Hall will remain open during construction, saving temporary relocation costs and avoiding disruption of city services.

Writer and Professor, J. Frank Dobie by Dr. Ken Bridges

Great storytelling is an honored tradition across the South and the Southwest. Texas, with its long history of engaging characters and adventures, has produced many tales to tell. Perhaps one of the most respected storytellers was writer and professor J. Frank Dobie.

Born James Frank Dobie on Sept. 26, 1888, a love of literature and the open prairie was instilled in him from birth. The family lived on a modest ranch in Live Oak County in South Texas. Dobie was the oldest of six children, and he worked the ranch with his family from a young age. In the evenings, after the day's chores had been completed, his father read to him and the other children from the family Bible while his mother read classic works of literature to them.

In order to finish high school, Dobie moved in with his grandparents in nearby Alice in 1904. After his 1906 graduation, he enrolled at Southwestern University in Georgetown. Armed with an education, life moved quickly for Dobie. After earning his bachelors degree, he began writing for a number of newspapers for a year before accepting a teaching position in 1911. Two years later, he left for Columbia University in New York City to pursue a masters degree in English. He returned to Texas in 1914 and began teaching at the University of Texas.

Dobie enlisted in the army as the United States entered World War I in 1917. After serving in the artillery for two years, he returned to the university in 1919. After his military experiences, he began expressing himself more with the written word and began publishing stories and studies of aspects of folklore in 1919. He joined the Texas Folklore Society to preserve folk tales and stories of the unique culture of the Southwest, rising to secretary of the organization by 1922.

His first major work was a short, clever booklet titled *Weather Wisdom of the Texas-Mexican Border* in 1923, noting how rain is never a subject far from the thoughts of Texas ranchers and farmers. Dobie wrote, "Everyone knows and quotes the saying, 'Nobody but a fool or a newcomer will prophesy the weather in Texas' – a saying vaunted before strangers but never remembered in their absence." The tome was filled with stories of how watching different animals can foretell the weather as well as his own stories of growing up in South

Texas before closing with the warning, "Be it remembered, all Texans have a saying, 'In dry weather all signs fail.'"

Dobie also played a role in preventing longhorn cattle from disappearing. He had been part of the university for several years when students chose the longhorn as the mascot in 1917. However, longhorns had fallen out of favor with ranchers and steadily fewer were being bred. Dobie grew concerned about the deteriorating numbers of the longhorn, and he started writing about them in 1920. He persuaded several ranchers and benefactors to buy a number of longhorns to stock at state parks starting in the 1920s and 1930s. As a result, more attention began to be brought to the iconic creatures, and their reputation as a symbol of Texas and reputation as livestock steadily increased. He completed a book on the life and legends of the breed in *The Longhorns* in 1941.

He wrote on his most famous works, the award-winning "*Coronado's Children*" in 1930. The book amassed tales of treasure-hunters and lost treasures. Ultimately, Dobie would publish more than 20 books in his lifetime, including "*Tales of the Mustang*" in 1936 and "*The Roadrunner in Fact and Folk-lore*" in 1939.

By 1939, he had a weekly newspaper column in which he not only discussed Texas culture but railed against the political injustices of the day. The state legislature became a frequent target of his barbs. He openly called for integrating the University of Texas in the early 1940s, leading him to clash with numerous state leaders. His fame grew to where he was invited to teach American History at Cambridge University during World War II.

In 1944, while still overseas, he angrily protested the firing of a fellow UT professor for his liberal views, leading to his own dismissal by 1947.

Later in his life, a new generation of Texas leaders came to appreciate Dobie's work and influence. On Sept. 14, 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom to Dobie in honor of his long career. The award from a fellow Texan was a great affirmation of his writing and the controversial stands he had taken throughout his life. The ailing Dobie died four days later. A large crowd gathered for his funeral, which was held on the University of Texas campus.

Dobie was honored after his death. A number of books have been written about him. A post office in San Antonio was named for him as well as the Dobie Center at the University of Texas. Dobie High School opened in Houston in 1968. Middle schools in Cibolo and Austin as well as an elementary school in Dallas now honor the famed writer.



Waiver for Vehicle Title and Registration Requirements Ends April 14, 2021

The temporary waiver of certain vehicle title and registration requirements, announced by Governor Greg Abbott on March 16, 2020, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, will end on April 14, 2021.

If you have not renewed your expired vehicle registration, you should make plans to renew by that date. It is not necessary to wait until the deadline to complete any overdue transactions as motorists have several renewal options. Before renewing registration, Texans will need to obtain a passing vehicle inspection at the state vehicle inspection station of their choice, unless their vehicle is exempt from inspection requirements.

The expiring temporary waiver covers the following services: • Initial vehicle registration • Vehicle registration renewal • Vehicle titling • Renewal of permanent disabled parking placards • 30-day temporary permits.
