# **Motorists Must Slow Down or Move Over for Emergency Vehicles and Tow Trucks Stopped on the Road**



When tow trucks and other emergency vehicles – police, fire, EMS and highway response trucks – are stopped on the side of the road with their lights activated, state law requires drivers to slow down or move over. Texas traffic laws require drivers to leave the lane closest to the emergency vehicles stopped on the road (if the road has more than one lane traveling in the same direction) or to slow down at least 20 miles per hour below the speed limit.

TDLR regulates the towing industry as well as the Driver Education and Safety program.

Safety tips for driving this summer:

- Slow down and pay attention to what you're doing. If you get tired, pull over in a safe spot and walk around to re-energize.
  - Don't drink and drive, even a little bit.
  - Designate a (sober) driver.
- Stay off the mobile phone this includes texting. Designate a "co-pilot" to oversee the phone while you're driving so you can concentrate on the task at hand.
  - Stay weather-aware. We're not expecting bad weather, but this

# Residential Garbage Collection Hours to Change

Due to the excessive heat, the city's residential garbage collection hours changed Wednesday, June 28 to start at 6 a.m. earlier than the usual 7 a.m. start time. Sanitation will still be working eight hours a day, Monday though Friday. The Street Department also impacted by the extreme heat working with Tarrant County will also start at 6 a.m. daily except on Friday.

The Water Department and City Hall will still keep their regular weekly schedule. We have had one heat related incident, and for our employees health and safety we deem it necessary to move the start time back to 6 a.m., especially for sanitation and streets. This is nothing new, we typically make this change each year in the summer so they can get an early start during the coolest part of the day.


## Professional Golfer, Byron Nelson by Dr. Ken Bridges

Texan **Byron Nelson** was a legend in sports.

In the 1940s, he was the most successful golfer in the world, never losing his faith or his modesty.

John Byron Nelson, Jr., was born in Waxahachie in 1912 to a hard-working family of devoted churchgoers.

In the 1920s, the family moved to Fort Worth, where Nelson soon found



work as a golf caddy at Glen Garden Country Club. He fell in love with golf, even playing in the dark of night. Here he met Ben Hogan, also a young caddy and also one of the future legends of the game.

Nelson turned professional in 1932 and took a number of jobs across the country running several golf clubs as head professional. His first tournament win was the 1935 New Jersey State Open. In 1937, he won The Masters Tournament, his first major championship win.

He had 21 professional wins before World War II erupted. While many other athletes served in the war, Nelson's hemophilia prevented him from serving. Nevertheless, he continued to play on the PGA Tour and worked to raise money for the war effort. He defeated his old friend Ben Hogan in a dramatic playoff in the 1942 Masters Tournament. The war caused most professional athletics to shut down for 1943, but Nelson came roaring back in 1944, winning eight tournaments in the shortened season.

In 1945, Nelson won 11 straight tournaments, thrilling sports fans. The winning streak set a record which has lasted for decades. He won his fifth and last major, the PGA Championship, in 1945. He won a total of 18 tournaments that year. The Associated Press would also name him its Male Athlete of the Year for 1944 and 1945. He went on to win six more tournaments in 1946 and finished in the Top 20 for 113 straight tournaments.

After the 1946 season, Nelson largely retired from golf after having won 64 tournaments. He continued to play in The Masters until 1966 and played on the American team for the Ryder Cup international tournament in 1947. His last tournament win was the 1955 French Open.

After retiring from golf, a move he said he never regretted, he fulfilled his dream of buying his own ranch. He was content to

work on his ranch outside Roanoke for the rest of his life. A humble man of faith, he continued to serve his church regularly, even serving as a janitor for the church on occasion.

Long after his retirement, Nelson remained a beloved figure by golf fans around the world. He helped coach and advise many young players struggling to find success on the PGA Tour and worked as an analyst for televised golf tournaments.

He also worked with children to help them learn golf and develop Nelson's same love for the game. In 1968, the PGA Tour renamed its Dallas tournament after Nelson.

For years, the Byron Nelson Classic was the only tournament named after a player. He was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 1974. The PGA also gave him its Lifetime Achievement Award in 1997.


# Lakeside Drive Repaving Project

## Dell DeHay Law Library

The Law Library was established in 1944 but did not officially open until October 1945. Over the next 30 years, the Law Library's staff and collections grew.

By 1979, it had received acclaim for its services, in large part, due to Dell DeHay, who served as Librarian from 1962 to 1979. That year, the Law Library became the Dell DeHay Law Library of Tarrant County in her honor. Continued growth and expansion led the Law Library to move to its present quarters on the fourth floor of the 1895 Courthouse during the 1983 renovation. The Dell DeHay Law Library of Tarrant County serves the legal research needs of the Tarrant County legal community and the general public. The Law Library is funded by a combination of a portion of court filing fees and user service fees. The Law Library receives direction and guidance from the Tarrant County Commissioners and the County Administrator.

The Dell DeHay Law Library of County is staffed by six won-derful individuals: Cara, Amanda, Brittany, Deneshia, Nancy, and Yancy.

The Law Library is located on the fourth floor of the 1895 Courthouse, in room 420, at 100 W. Weatherford Street, in downtown Fort Worth.

#### **Parking**

The most convenient parking is in the Tarrant County Calhoun Street Parking Garage. It is located on the corner of Weatherford and Calhoun. Calhoun is a one-way street running north to south. The garage entrance is on Calhoun across from the side entrance of the Family Law Center. Be prepared to pay to park. The parking garage accepts all major credit/debit cards.

Parking is also available at parking meters on all four sides of the Courthouse. Most of the meters have a two-hour time limit and are strictly enforced. If you have handicap plates or a placard, parking at the meters is free, but time limits still apply.
