According to the Blue Star Families 2020 Military Lifestyle Survey, deployment and time spent away from family were two of the top five issues facing active duty, Reserve and National Guard families today.

Emergency Outdoor Warning Siren System

The city of White Settlement and the city of Fort Worth have emergency warning siren systems that service the communities. These sirens will be activated not only for tornados, but when emergency situations arise that have the potential to affect White Settlement and nearby areas. Sirens will be activated for the following: a tornado warning issued by the National Weather Service, tornado or funnel cloud reported by a reliable source, sustained winds in excess of 60 miles per hour, reports of hail larger than one inch, chemical spill emergency, state or national emergency declared by the governor or president, and other emergencies as appropriate.

The city of White Settlement and city of Fort Worth both test the sirens on the first Wednesday of each month at 1 p.m. The test will run for about 90 seconds. The test will not be conducted on holidays or during periods of inclement weather.

If you hear the sirens during times other than the test times, seek shelter indoors and check one of the local radio or television stations for further information on the emergency.

Texas History Minute

First President of the University of Texas, George Winston

The University of Texas has been in operation for nearly 140 years. Since that time, tens of thousands of UT graduates have enjoyed careers in all fields that have shaped both the state and the world alike. In its early years, it struggled as it had difficulty finding students, funding, or respect. It took the efforts of its first president, George T. Winston, to change the direction of UT.

George Tayloe Winston was born in North Carolina in 1852. Exceptionally bright, he entered the University of North Carolina at age 13 in 1866. The college, however, was struggling after the end of the Civil War and shut down. Instead, Winston accepted an appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy, attending from 1868 to 1870. Though he excelled academically, severe seasickness ended his naval career, and he left the academy. He earned a in literature from degree Cornell University in New York in 1874 and then returned to North Carolina.

The University of North Carolina had reopened by 1875, and Winston took a position as professor of Latin and German. Respected by his fellow professors, he was named secretary of the faculty.

In 1891, Winston was promoted to president of the university. He understood the potential that a university could have for an impoverished state looking to rebuild its economy. He went across the state to convince residents of the university's importance, which helped improve its reputation and enrollment. Within a few years, its income would double and enrollment in recognition of his work.
